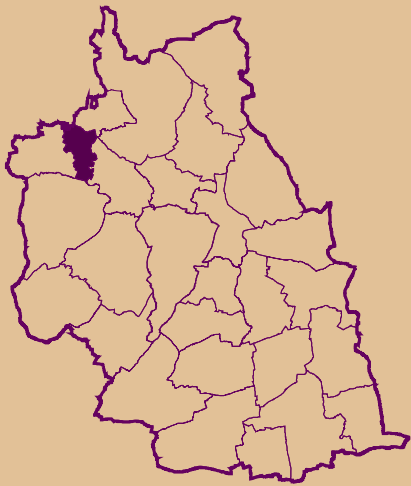

Barrack Road, Mill House and Outbuilding

House, mid-late C19. 2 storeys. Hipped slate roof. Brickwork, now painted. Projecting string course at first floor level. 4 bays, sash windows with stone cills. Open hipped roof canopy to front. West side: red brick chimney stack. Single storey outbuilding constructed of brick with a thatched roof in the grounds, probably the base of a C18/C19 tower windmill.

Significance

A good example of a simple large mid-late C19 rural house. Rare surviving fragment of the windmill base. Architectural and historic interest. Group value with Mill Cottage.

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Bedfords Hill, 1-3 (inclusive) Bedford Farm Cottages

Cottages, late C19. Built as farm worker cottages for the Bedford Farm estate. 2 storey, hipped slate roof with clay ridge tiles, red brick with stock brick detailing. Sash windows.

Significance

A good and relatively unaltered example of late C19 rural farm workers cottages.

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Chignal Road, Mashbury Hall

House, C18 or earlier origin. 2 main parallel ranges of 2 ½ storeys, the front lobby entry with a central chimney stack. Mostly red brick and clay plain tile roofs, with half hips to the main roof and half hips with gablets to the rear range. 1 and 2 story, C19 and C20 additions, in matching materials, but partly rendered. Remnants of a moat surround the house.

Significance

A good example of a C17 or earlier manor house on an ancient and prominent rural site. Forms part of the setting to Mashbury Church.

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Mashbury parish



Chignal Road, The Cottage

House, formerly a parsonage, C18 or earlier origin. Low 2 storeys. Crosswing to the northern end with a hipped plain tile roof. Main range with a gabled roof. Timber frame, partly rendered, partly clad in weatherboard. Casement windows, with leaded lights. Red brick chimney stack.

Significance

A rural cottage of C18 or earlier origins, formerly a parsonage.

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Chignal Road, 1-3 (inclusive) Shop Cottages

Cottages, formerly the village shop. Numbers 1 and 2: Mid C19, 2 storey, hipped slate roof, central red brick chimney stack, brickwork rendered. Number 1: with a C19 lean-to on the southern end. Number 2: with porch. Number 3: C18 or earlier, 1 ½ storeys, gabled roof with a hip on the northern end, clad in corrugated iron, formerly thatched, dormers with cat slide roofs clad in slate.

Significance

A rural group of cottages of mid C19 and earlier origins.

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Chignal Road, The Chase House

House, medieval origin. 2 storey crosswing at the southern end, with a hipped roof. Main range 1 ½ storeys with gabled dormers. Plain tile roofs. Timber frame rendered. Casement windows. Red brick chimney stacks.

Significance

A picturesque house of medieval origin.

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Fox Road, Fudlers Hall and Outbuildings (Also known as Mount Pleasant)

House, C18 or earlier origins. 2 ½ storeys. Gambrel roof clad in plain tiles, with cat slide dormers. Stock brick walls. 4 window range to front, with small paned sashes. End wall chimney stacks.

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Outbuildings include a three bay barn, timber framed clad in weatherboard and plain tile roof, with a mid strey on the northern side. Stable block with a weathervane, timber frame clad in weatherboard, plain tile roof. Cart lodge, partly brick, partly timber frame clad in weatherboard, pan tile roof.

Various C19 documents, including deeds, held at the Essex Record Office (reference D/DU 1130/2)

Significance

A good example of a gambrel roof farmhouse and outbuildings. Architectural and historic interest. A prominent landmark. The house and outbuildings form a group.



Fox Road, Mashbury House



House, C18 origin, much altered. 2 ½ storeys. Timber frame, rendered. Gabled plain tile roof with gabled dormers to rear (north) side. Substantial red brick chimney stacks. Central porch. Casement windows with leaded lights. Single storey additions.

Significance

A site of ancient origin, with a manor house of C18 origin. Historic interest.



Fox Road, The Fox



House, formerly a public house. Early C19, probably earlier origin. 1 ½ storey front range. Timber frame, rendered. Plain tile roof with half hipped and red brick chimney stacks. Three gabled dormers to the front. 1 and 1 ½ storey additions to the rear with plain tile, slate and glass roofs. Shown as The Fox Public House on the first edition OS map 1874-5.

Significance

A good example of an early C19 former public house.
